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

If given the chance, I would like to be a plain housewife, just a typical Filipina wife who will cook, clean the house and look after her husband and kids. I wonder if anybody out there will actually take me for what I am? What if one of my clients actually recognized me one day on a function when I'm with my husband and kids? I have seen a lot of movies with the same scenario. People laugh at it, I also laugh when I see situations that relates to what I do but at the same time I get a pinch in the heart because it has either happened to me or it is fixely to happen to me someday. All these thoughts play in my mind on a constant basis, will I ever find love? Do I deserve to find a true love and happiness?


When guys hear or read about "prostate miking" they get really curious and they want to try it. Most of the time I get anonymous calls just inquiring about it, most of my clients now are actually repeat clients. The thing is, their once a month visit can become twice or thrice a month visit or even more. They get addicted to the service. I was once even forced to charge just \$50 to a client because he was spending his weekly pay to get the service and he is a single parent with 3 kids. I thought the kids deserve to benefit from his pay more than I should! It is hard on my part because I am running a business not a charity but my conscience tells me to be understanding as well.

I'm actually a transsexual; I require a lot of maintenance so I have to charge more than real girls. Lately I have been fighting with some friends because their clients are switching to my service, perhaps they get more satisfied with me, and I don't really care because I am running a business. I have to sacrifice friendship to get more money. I don't even know who my real friends are now because I feel that everybody is just spying on each other. I'm quite paranoid now: I don't trust anyone in this business.

In this line of business you have to work double time to maintain your target cash every week. I don't get to choose my client; I welcome anybody who has cash. Old, fat, ugly guys seem to



have the big cash to pay for my services; good looking guys don't pay much so I seldom go with them. This business is very risky. STD is very easy to catch and a condom is actually not enough to protect yourself most of the time. I have to constantly get a sexual health check to make sure that I am clean and disease-free. I got into trouble one time when one of my clients came back to me and blamed me because he got his wife infected with STD after having sex with mel. Most common STD's are easy to get rid of but the treatment for Syphilis hurts a lot. I had it twice last year and believe me; the penicilin injections gave me a harsh horse kick in the backside! Even if I'm really careful, I can still easily catch a disease from someone.

Western Australia is my tenttory; I think I've had sex with almost half of the male population in this region! That's why I have to constantly wear different wigs whenever I go shopping so that people won't recognise me at all, especially when I go to the church - Lactually still pray you know. I need to also change my name on a constant basis to get new clients because it is a very small community here. It seems that guys want to experience new things all the time that's why I have to keep on re-inventing myself. A client's wife actually knocked on my door one day and as soon as I opened the door she kicked me in the stomach and threatened to kill me! I wanted to go to the police but I might get into trouble more because I don't have license to run my prostitution business. I was forced to move to another suburb because of this and I had to also replace my phone number. I hope nobody would splash acid on my face one day because that would be the end of my livelihood as a sex worker. If I lose this job I don't know how my family back home would survive anymore. I have been in this business for a while so I don't know any other jobs.



HOW I FOUND A SECOND HOME IN THE PHILIPPINES

Philippines. Amongst all of the places I have travelled to around the world it is one of my favourite countries to visit. It's a time to go shopping, eat lots of Jalibee, go shopping, book into luxurious day spas (at a fraction of the price I fork out in Sydney), go shopping, work on my tan by the five star hotel pool, and did I mention go shopping? It's atways a fantastic holiday experience.

And this is what it's like for a lot of young Filipinos living autside of the Philippines who travel back to the 'homeland'. Yes, it is also a time to visit extended family. But in a lot of ways, the Philippines is a 'holklay destination' to many young second generation Filipino migrants who live outside of the Philippines.

Homeland. Holiday destination. Two contradictory terms signifying quite different experiences. The latter denotes travels to the exotic and the foreign where you are for the most part a tourist. The former alludes to a sacred return to your roots and origins where you are essentially a native. I believe that for many second generation Filipino migrants, a visit back to the Philippines treads a fine line between these two notions. For myself, I had always felt that the line wasn't so fine at all. It's difficult to feel an emotional attachment to a place as some kind of 'home' when it exists only in the nostalgic stories told by my parents, barely surviving in my own fragmented memory, and is only half heartedly summoned in the occasional visits that I make. I had always talked about the Philippines as a 'holiday' first and a kind of abstract 'motherland' second.

On my most recent visit to the Philippines this year I returned with my family and expected us to check into the Shangri-La Hotel in Makati like we usually do. However, this time around, my mother advised me that the house her family had built was now complete and that this was where we were to stay. I didn't really like the idea but I went with it.

The house is built on the original land on Aragon Street in Frisco where my mother's family lived. I remember the place because I spent a few years of my childhood there. But upon arriving I realised straight away that it had changed – the neighbours, the streetscape, and the landmarks that I fondly remembered where gone. So far not so good – everything in my memory about this place that could have given me any semblance of belonging had vanished. More tragically, we were a good twenty minutes outside of Makati (an hour when there is traffic and there is always traffic) and seemingly so far away from the splendours of Shangri-La.

I had a lengthy debate with my mother, insisting that this was not the holiday I was expecting. But despite my steely determination she won the battle. And so I unpacked my bags and tried to make myself feel comfortable. It's not that the house isn't nice. My mother and her family built it to cater for the westernised needs of their 'Australianised' offspring. But it just wasn't Shangri-La—that 'home away from home' experience that tourist hotels cleverly fabricate. I was in a house that looked like a home but it wasn't my home.

But after a few days at Aragon Street I started to feel differently.

The house has three levels. The ground floor is rented out to my father's sister and her family. And so, instead of my cousins making the trek out to the city to visit their balkbayan relatives, we could easily see each other every day. At first I longed for the anonymity that came with staying in a hotel where nobody could disturb you unless invited. But I slowly began to look forward to the daily disturbances of my tita coming in through our door to share the latest family gossip about second and third cousins whom I had never even met yet whose scandalous lives I became thoroughly interested in. My Lola also fived with my tita and so my mornings consisted of walking downstairs to their unit and sitting with my Lola to watch a few Filipino dramas. Aside from the hearing impairments that my Lola has, she can't speak English and I can't really speak Tagalog (and we were both too embarrassed to try), and so watching the images on the screen together was the only way we could really bond. By noon everyone was awake, and along with my cousins, my siblings and I would gather by the bench outside the house and plan our day. We'd smoke too many cigarettes and watch tricycles zoom past, and despite the extreme heat, we would often spend more time on this bench talking and joking around than actually carrying out our plans for the day. Sometimes my brothers would join in on a game of street basketball with some canto boys who would only let them play in tsinelas. Life is slow in the Philippines. Despite how much you might want to get out and about - it has a way of forcing you to abide by its pace. Surprisingly, I began not to mind at all that I wasn't always in the surrounds of a busy mail spending money that I didn't really have.

My stay at Aragon Street altered my usually detached tourist experience of the Philippines. I became implicated in the given social and cultural setting. I was finally able to construct a sense of belonging to the Philippines and formed an understanding of what a 'homeland' might be. The idea of homeland was suddenly transformed from abstract notions of roots and origins to a concrete lived experience of family togetherness and kinship ties, a reconnection with language, and an embodied experience of culture.

There is nothing like the rupture of migration to displace senses of home and belonging. But through the house on Aragon Street, my siblings and I acquired a real sense of place in the Philippines – the experience of a 'visit' was replaced by a deeper experience of 'return'.

Moo Gourmet Burgers is located at four fantastic locations in New South Wales, Australia – Manly, Coogee, Newtown, Bondi and they are soon to open another branch in Crow's Nest.

Only the freshest and highest quality ingredients are used in their selection of 20 delicious gourmet burgers. All beef burgers are made with 100% Australian Angus Pure Natural Beef. There are 3 vegetarian options as well as a selection of premium burgers including the double Wagyu beef "Deluxe Moo", Duck & Bacon, Greek Lamb, and Grilled Salmon. I have discovered the perfect way to prove yourself this weekend if you are looking for a bit of fun and you're a heavy eater. The Austrian Schnitzelhaus located in Erina and in Gladesville is the perfect weekend challenge for all food lovers with big appetites.

The Schnitzel challenge involves 1kg of chicken Schnitzel with chips and sauce of your choice and 1 litre of Erdinger Weissbier beer for \$55. The champion Schnitzel eater holds the record for a mere 15 minst Finish it all and you could score yourself a free dessert (although I doubt you will have room for it), a t-shirt, a schnapps and your photo in the champions wall of fame . . . So bring it on!

My partner was very proud that he successfully completed the challenge but it was even a struggle for him even though he is a huge eater. He finished the meal in less than an hour so it's a lot harder than it actually looks.
