I am 29 years old and I used to be a panel beater in the southem part of Iran. Linitially went to Japan with a tourist Visa and luckily I found a job there so I decided to stay and become an illegal immigrant until I got caught two years later. I eventually got detained and deported to Thailand with no money in my pockets. In desperation, I begged a container ship captain to take me on board. I travelled with the ship for two months and worked without pay until the Captain of the ship offered to drop me off in Indonesia on a boat to Australia. I was hesitant at first but since I was extremely desperate I took the offer. A few weeks later I ended up in the middle of nowhere and the only thing that I could see in the middle of the sea was a small fisherman's boat and the container ship where I was supposed to be boarding. I joined other people in the small boat and I was actually with around 15-20 men, women and children on board that boat. We never spoke to each other and I didn't even know what nationality they were. We travelled for two days on very rough seas until the Australian Coast Guard found, rescued and brought us to Darwin.

#### Hadi

I am 23 years old and I used to be a Personal Trainer in Iran. My life was so easy back then in Tehran. I used to rent an apartment and I had a number of clients who I used to train at the gym at least 2 to 3 times a week. You might notice that I actually have a pretty toned body and a face with model features so I used to live like a celebrity - I used to even own the latest Peugeot car. On my 23rd birthday this year while I was having a drink at my relative's house, my uncle mentioned that if I wanted to further my career as a Personal Trainer then I should go to Australia because I will earn triple the money that I was earning in Iran. I would also have a lot more freedom in Australia so I will definitely enjoy living in the country, plus, he also talked about all the pretty blonde ladies that I can meet and possibly date over there. It sounded really attractive to me - I was sold to the ideal. As you know, after the revolution things changed in Iran. What used to be a free European style living country became a conservative country under a Muslim government ran by the Sha.

A week after my birthday I travelled to Asia and enjoyed a few weeks in various travel destinations until I eventually arrived in Indonesia. A few days later I went to see someone who happens to be a "people smuggler" and I inquired about how I could get to Australia. I asked what was involved and what consequences will I face if I get caught.

He told me nothing but good things. He bragged about the

benefits that I will get as soon as I arrive in the country as a refugee - I was definitely lured by the promise of great things ahead. Before I knew it I have already paid him \$5,000 dollars to get me on board the next ship to Australia. We had to leave the next day already but when I got to the ship, to my surprise - I just saw a small fishing boat waiting for us in a river in Indonesial I was actually expecting a big ship. Well I initially thought it was just a vessel to get us into the sea to board a bigger vessel so I boarded with my expensive suitcase together with 70 other people, around 11 of us were tranians. As we approached the big ocean, I couldn't see any other bigger ships at all so I asked the driver of the boat where he was taking us and he merely replied "to Australia". I immediately panicked and asked him to turn the boat around because I don't want to continue my journey anymore. But then he just turned around and responded with "too late, you

Every passenger assumed that there will be a bigger boat so nobody was ready to travel and nobody brought any food or water on board the boat. We travelled day and night and braved massive waves, twice of these two waves even sunk us for a while but luckly the boat managed to comeback afloat after the ordeal. On board you will hear a number of people crying and praying all the time in different languages. The good life I used to have in Iran flashed on my mind every now and then throughout the whole perious journey. I wasn't ready to die or take any of those challenges but then I also understood that there was simply no turning back. I realized that I took a big risk.

either shut your mouth or I will throw you out in the water!"

After six terrifying days out on the sea we were eventually rescued by the Australian Coast Guard and we were all brought to Christmas Island. I then felt a mixture of excitement, fear and disorientation at the time as we went on board the Coastguard vessel which eventually took us to the Detention centre.

## Editor's Notes



If you are visiting the Philippines soon and you're looking for a restaurant that serves authentic and delicious Filpino food then Via Mare is definitely the place for you!

Via Mare has everything from good old fashioned authentic Filipino dishes such as Chicken Arroz Caldo and Dinuguan to meryenda meals such as Halo Halo and Bibingka. The prices aren't too bad either especially if you're a Balkbayan and spending dollars rather than pesos.

My favourites would have to be Chicken

Arroz Caldo. Tocino (thinly sliced cured meat in pineapple marinate), Vigan Langanisa ( Crispy fried pork meat sausage flavoured with black peppercorns), Crispy Tapa (Marinated beef sirloin), Pancit Molo (Soup and noadles topped with shrimp, pork, chicken and ham), Palabok and Sinigang na Tiyan ng Bangus (Mikfish bellies in sour broth ). The Inasal na Manok in Skewers is also to die for and so are the Rellenong Talong, Crispy Binagoongan (Crispy pork bellies with bagoong), Inihaw na Liempo (Grilled pork belly), Kare-Kare and Tortang Alimasog.

# LIFE AND TIMES OF DOCTOR CEN AMORES

It was her late father, Domingo Palomares, who provided the strong, early example that propelled Dr. Cen Amores on her road to community service. Growing up in a large family, "sharing was natural." Her father was a farmer and the barangay (village) captain who used to butcher carabaos (water buffalos) every weekend to sell. Many people would come to barter their own farm produce for the beef. But for those who had nothing to barter, Mr Palomares not only accepted their performing odd jobs for a share of the meat, but made sure that they "were fed as well." When she asked her father about his generosity, he simply replied, "because they have nothing so we have to share."


Since then, Dr Amores has not only followed her father's example, but has thrived in it and fived a life that would make any parent proud. After gaining her Doctorate in Education (Educational Management) from the University of Northern Philippines, she and her family moved to Australia in 1991 and settled in Aubum – considered a major hub of multiculturalism in New South Wales. She took her doctorate and became a teacher (with 13 years' experience) for the South Western Sydney Institute of TAFE, Martin College, Metropolitan Business College and various other private companies as well as being an Employment Consultant helping job seekers, especially the highly disadvantaged and long-term employed, find their way back into the work environment. She considers this a "great achievement in life...being able to help others to change for the better and for them to be able to control their lives."

In her husband, Mr Ruben Amores, Cen has found a partner in her passion for community service. She has found a "...loving lifetime partner who shares the same values – social responsibility, human rights advocacy, respect for human dignity, a welcoming attitude and equality for all." She and Ruben work side-by-side on many community outreach projects not just for the Filipino community but for many other cultures as well. An example is the multi-award winning, Kapit-bahayan Co-operative Ltd (KCL). KCL aims to provide affordable, comfortable housing for low-to-middle income families from many cultural backgrounds. Beginning in Auburn, KCL has expanded to other suburbs such as Berala, Wentworthville, Merrylands and Canley Vale. Dr Amores explained that the housing cooperative model was not only economically sound but "...gives people a sense of security, an opportunity to practice grassroots democracy, assume social responsibility, practice effective leadership, promote mutual support, an exercise of empowerment and a great sense of ownership – all very important ingredients in building an ideal community!"

Their partnership has also led to the birth of other projects such as the Aubum Small Community Organisation Network (ASCON) and the Aliance of Philippine Community Organisations (APCO) for which Dr Amores is the founding president. The list of what they have achieved together is a long one. Many of their projects have received recognition from both local and state governments. Earlier this year, among 40 other distinguished Australians, Dr Amores was named by Prime Minister Julia Gilliard, a 'People of Australia' Ambassador. Each individual was nominated for their work in promoting stronger ties between cultures in their own communities. Shortly thereafter, Dr Amores received another distinction. She was included in a select group of women who were bestowed the 'Women of the West' by the University of Western Sydney on March 2, 2012 in celebration of the International Women's Day.

From her humble beginnings in a small rural village in Barangay Sagneb, San Ildefonso, Ilocos Sur, Dr Cen Amores has become a life-changing force in the multicultural communities of Western Sydney. Working as a tireless champion for the "marginalised people in the community," she holds true to her tenet that "....nobody should stop you from pursuing what you think is right and just, especially for the weak and less fortunate." She believes that "every person is a unique individual," so, like her father, she is passionate about using one's talents to help others – "...the more you have, the more you share." It is no surprise to know that she will never cease her work. That "...! shall continue to contribute my share of building an ideal community... break down cultural barriers... and making people from across the world feel welcome regardless of their personal and social circumstances."





Having grown up in Australia, lived in America, and travelled around the globe since I was a child, I am constantly reminded how lucky I am to have "this life."

"Don't take for granted the blessings you have," I was always told – and rightly so. We Filipino-Australian youngsters seem to have it easy, with our stomachs always full, designer clothes on our back and our only worries being what club to attend this weekend and how to pay off our sky-high mobile phone bills.

But something deep down inside yearned to leave the daily grind and superficiality I fived and breathed on a daily basis. Part of me was always left unsatisfied, unfulfilled. I wanted something more. I yearned to explore my country of origin, the land my parents grew up in, the place my ancestors came

And most of all, I yearned to make an impact and to help, in some way, my fellow Pinoys back home.

After winning one of six coveted Myer and Australia Korea Foundation (AKF) scholarships to South-East Asian newspapers three years ago. I was finally given that rare chance.

Three years ago I was sent to work at the Philippine Daily Inquirer, all expenses paid. My task: to get on-the-job experience at the leading national newspaper, get articles published and explore my home country. My personal mission: to make some kind of impact and to help my kapwa in those five weeks.

As I stepped off that plane at NAIA and felt the thick, smoky Manila air enter my lungs, my heart filled with joy. As I stepped onto that turf, I knew deep inside my heart that this was home, and that I had a purpose for being here.

On my first day on the job, I was privileged enough to meet and converse with the legendary Isagani Yambot, now publisher of the Inquirer and a brilliant journalist from my parents' day, as well as Letty Jimenez-Magsanoc, another highly respected journalist and now editor-in-chief of The Inquirer.

Mr. Yambot sent me to cover the Malacanang beat at the Inquirer, the most prestigious and coveted beat of all, covering the activities of President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo and therefore filled with press conferences, balls and presidential

visits. It was an absolute honour to be sent to Malacanang Palace on my first week.

On my third day, I was privileged enough to attend the jaw-droppingly stunning Vin D'Hanneur, the Malacanang Diplomat's Ball for 2008. The opulence was overwhelming: Malacanang Palace literally took my breath away with its gittering crystal chandeliers, plush velvety carpet and its incredible artwork.

I was also lucky enough to travel all over Luzon on presidential trips and ride with the Presidential convoy which was so surreal. It was as if the whole city was put on pause while we rode through, sirens blaring.

The best part of my trip was meeting and befriending one of the Inquirer's brilliant journalists - my trainer and now very close friend for life Michael Lim Ubac, the youngest reporter on the Malacanang Palace beat, Michael is such an Inspiring individual, having grown up poor in the provinces, and now traveling the world with President GMA and having his articles published on the front page of Philippines #1 newspaper every day, I also befriended Gil Cabacungan Jr., my mentor during my two week-long beat at the Philippine Senate and also a highly respected journalist, along with Roy Pelovello from The Manila Standard and Reymund Tinaza from Bombo Radyo. I was also privileged enough to work with Nadya Trinidad of ABS-CBN and Jove Francisco of ABC (see picture), all of whom took me under their wing during my stay at Malacanang

A great highlight of the trip was partying with countless media personalities. On my third night, I found myself partying with Michael Lim Ubac and ABS-CBN reporter Ruth Cabal, who I'd just seen reporting on television that day. Everyone I met during my stay was so down-to-earth and incredibly intelligent. Indeed, I truly made some close, life-long friends within the Philippine media industry.

All this isn't to say that I did not face challenges. Long, hot showers became a distant memory as I was presented with a big container where I was forced to collect water and subsequently bathe with a tabo (little bucket), Furthermore, Filipina mosquitoes could not get enough of my sweet foreign blood, and I suffered a short bout of food poisoning after eating from a street stall.

But, after a week or so of inward griping, I realised how shallow and superficial my complaints were when I got to see how blessed I was compared to so many of my fellow Filipinos.

Commuting to work every day, I was able to see the immense poverty our country is home to: the waterside shanties, the children running around naked and barefoot, the roadside beggars. It truly opened my eyes, as a Filipina, and as a human: opened my eyes, and simultaneously broke my

Being witness to such contrasts, I decided to write an article that I was passionate about - the pursuit of democracy by thousands of ordinary Flipinos during the EDSA 1 "People Power" Revolution, which my parents were active in, and just in time it for the EDSA anniversary on February 22-25.

While I had numerous articles published in the previous weeks, this topic was closest to my heart, and I didn't care whether or not it got published - I just knew that I had to write it.

Little did I know, the article was to land an front page of the Inquirer - with me and my mother's picture on it.

This was probably the proudest moment of my entire life. To be 21 years old then, not yet a graduate, and the editors valuing my article enough to place it on front page.

The best part of it was that the next day, and for the week to come, I received countless calls and texts from people all around Philippines that I had met in the past five weeks, congratulating me for an article well done and for reminding them of the true meaning behind the People Power. One message brought me to tears:

"Your article brought back memories of my late father, who was involved in EDSA 1. I was just a kid then, so I couldn't join, but I was right there at EDSA 2. Thank you for writing this article, and for reminding me what it means to be Filipino."

I achieved my goal: to somehow, through my writing, make an impact on people's lives, and to help pursue democracy through my pen. The knowledge that I somehow impacted other people's lives changed mine.

I will never forget my trip to the Philippines and my internship at the Philippine Daily Inquirer. The experience helped me grow as a Filipina, and as an individual.

I think if I had any advice to pass on to any FilOz youth. journalists or otherwise, it would be to go for your dreams. Don't even second-guess yourself. We have been born into privilege; let us not waste it. As I said in my EDSA article: "The onus now lies on us...to stop talking and start doing. The torch has been passed. We have the responsibility to pick up where our parents left off,"

Let our lives be useful and let us, using our own skills, serve others: the dividends are above and beyond what you could ever expect. Take my word for it.

I'd say in an office. We'd have an office by then and the DDG members would be working for us in the form of a modelling agency. That's probably samething that we are working on at the moment.


# Meet some of the DDG members ....

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

# CHRISTMAS IN THE PHILIPPINES

Christmas is a very important part of the Filipino culture, and the Philippines has one of the most interesting traditions in the world of observing the Christmas holiday. We are noted for having the longest Christmas holiday in the Christian world, sometimes beginning as early as September and not ending until the first Sunday in January. Three Kings' Day.

However, the official start of the Christmas holiday in the Philippines is December 16th, when the "Misas De Aguinaldo," or "Simbang Gabi," or "Gift Masses" begin. The masses run for nine consecutive days and are traditionally held at, or just before dawn. These masses are very important to millions of Filipinos. On December 24th, traditional Flipinos' also celebrate "La Misa de Gallo", or the "Mass of the Rooster". The rooster is used to refer to the rooster crowing at the sun at dawn. The "La Misa de Gallo" is the final mass of the nine consecutive early morning masses, and is the official start of the Christmas day.

"La Noche Buena," the Christmas feast, is an integral part of the Philippines' Christmas celebrations. For those fortunate enough to be able to afford it, the star of the Christmas meal is the "Queso de Bola" (Edam cheese shaped into a giant ball and covered in red wax) and a juicy Christmas ham, but only for the few who can afford it. In many parts of the Philippines, in the run up to Christmas, children roam from house to hause singing carols, just as children do in other parts of the world.

The Christmas celebration continues all the way through New Year's Eve and New Year's Day to January 6 - The Feast of the Three Kings. Filipinos celebrate New Year's Eve with fireworks and loud noises to bring in the New Year - according to superstition, the loud noises will deter any bad spirits trying to enter. Then familles and friends gather in the New Year feast and at the stroke of midnight, children are encouraged to jump - following another superstition that jumping will help them grow taller in the New Year!

All in all there certainly is nothing like a Christmas holiday spent in the Philippines, try it sometime you will surely love it!

So the big question is, what's next for the boxing superstar? Will he resume fighting or is he finally hanging up the gloves?


