
OPENING REMARKS



5. Take Charge

Let your passion drive you to your way to stardom. Invest in yourself and commit to learning and mastering your craft. If you're an actor perhaps you can check out acting workshops or organizations who offer trainings and seminars. You can even start with your local theatre. If there's any available role you think you are able to perform, audition. Once you've appeared in a few performances, you'll have the experience needed to get an agent's attention that may be able to find other related jobs for you. A number of stage actors work in commercials, TV and movies, so your theatre colleagues will be able to advise you, and even recommend agents who may be able to help you.

If you're a model you can always start by doing things for free to get your foot in the door. Start doing portfolio shoots with legitimate photographers and start getting involved in various runway events even if initially it's for free to get exposure and you never know – someone important might spot you and give you the break you've been waiting for.

How to break into the INDUSTRY

Dreaming to be the next singing sensation?

Who wouldn't want to be a singing superstar! Hordes of fans cheering you on as you perform on stage ... Countless endorsements Amazing perks that comes along with the fame.... What a life right?

Fame and fortune may come only once so the instant it comes knocking on your door, you need to make sure you are ready for it!

So what does it take to be singing sensation?

Marty Rendleman, the president of Dallas-based Rendleman Management Group gave us her thoughts on the matter. She acts as a consultant to a number of young artists, she evaluates countless of audition tapes on a daily basis and recommends improvements to aspiring singers' on their press kits. Through her years in the music industry, Rendleman has had the chance to work with a number of artists and she has also been associated with a number of music icons as well. She has this to say when asked about the most surprising advice for someone who wants to make it in the music industry:

"One of the most shocking things about the music business is that it's not all about a voice. You can have a voice and still not have a career. I try to encourage these kids to have more than one thing they can do. The more things you have, the better your chances are. You've got to sing and play and maybe write songs, too. Then you've got to have a good management, the right label, the right entertainment attorney, the right representation. There's way more talent than there is record deals. We all can't have a record deal."

"I tell the kids to use their talent. Sing in the church choir, sing for your friends. Go to school. Get on a stage somewhere with a live band and sing if that makes you happy. Everyone wants to stand in the spotlight and hold the microphone, because that's everybody's dream. There are other things you can do besides that to share your talent. I say, don't get your heart broken if that doesn't happen. Put God at the centre of your life and get out of the way. His plans are going to be way better than anything you could come up with yourself," she added.

Perhaps you've seen contestants on Idols, The X Factor, The Voice, and all the other singing contests in TV where the next ordinary girl or guy turns out to be the next singing sensation in each series. What do you think they have in common though?

They all stand out from the crowd and braved every test, earned the confidence of the crowd and proved that they deserve to be the best among the rest! So if you want to be the next sensation then you need to be willing to do whatever it takes.

HOW TO PROJECT A CLOTHING LINE EFFECTIVELY IN CatVall

In the world of fashion, it's a must for every designer to find a model that can flaunt their designs and products in such a way that they can capture the audience's attention and eventually generate revenue.

In the world of fashion, it's a must for every designer to find a model that can flount their designs and products in such a way that they can capture the audience's attention and eventually generate revenue. Therefore designers need to hire models that are not just stunning but who can also make an impact and leave a lasting impression.

Here are some 5 important tips that every model should know when it comes to effectively projecting a clothing line in the catwalk:

Mind your shoes

In the fashion industry, the type of shoes that you are wearing actually describes your taste in fashion because it demonstrates how stylish and creative you are as an individual.
Therefore you need to ensure that you are wearing the
right shoes - wearing something like flip flops is a definite
no-no! You should always practice walking on high heels
all the time because walking on high heels needs to be
second nature as they are a fixture in the fashion scene.

Mind your posture

Having the right posture is actually not enough to work that runway. You need to learn how to project the clothes that you are modelling using your shoulders, arms, feet, legs, head and body in such a way that the clothes stand out not you. Try walking or standing with your shoulders protruding forward and your hands swinging backwards. You can also try bending your hips forward but just a little so that you will look like your leaning forward instead

of standing straight.

Mind your stance

It is important to note what your feet actually looks like whenever you are standing or walking on a runway. Always remember that you toes should be facing outwards to the point that it creates a zigzag effect. Keep in mind that you are also modelling your shoes or your toes on the runway and making them face inward will create an unpleasing and disturbing sight.

Mind your Facial angles

Whenever you are walking or standing on a runway, make sure that your chin is always elevated because this will actually create an illusion of a longer neck. When you are walking the runway make sure that you balance your walk and look straight ahead - lifting your head will give other people a chance to see your facial features. Lifting your head a bit higher will also project focus and glamour.

Deliver the message correctly

Whenever you are walking on a runway with a designer's clothing line, keep in mind that you are also delivering a message to potential buyers. Make sure that you create your own signature walk and be confident about it to grab people's attention. You need to make people believe how great the outfit is ar how comfortable it is because in a nutshell you are responsible for the product being sold in the market.

Her passion for acting is drawn from the freedom of expression it provides and how it is able to broadcast a lesson to a broad audience in an instant. Surprisingly though, acting was not her first career - and the change in profession did not sit well with her parents at

movie review

Metallica 3D

I was invited to review the new film by Nimrod Antal, "Metallica, Through the Never" which was a 3D film presented by Hopscotch Films.

When it comes to Metallica, I would be lying to say I was one of their biggest fans. I have owned the odd Metallica shirt, I know the words to several of their songs but listing them in my top 10 bands isn't even close to happening. This presented a challenge for me - do I accept the job or do I decline based on the fact that I wasn't a hardcore metal fan?"

I decided to go to the screening and see whether the movie was appealing to not only the "hard core" fans, but also people who may not have much "Metallica experience" under their belt. After all, it was 3D - who doesn't like 3D?

The movie starts with a sweeping aerial view of the city which eventually ends up in the car park where Metallica are due to play. Your stereotypical metal fan is losing his mind about being first to the concert and a skater rides past, interrupting the opening scene. We follow the skater inside the building where we find out his name is "Trip" and he works for the people who are running the concert.

The concert begins and for someone who isn't THAT into Metallica, I got goosebumps. The combination of perfect sound and impeccable graphics makes you feel as if you're right there, standing next to the band. The stage set up and lighting is phenomenal and the 3D crowd interaction gives you a 'next best thing' experience that I have never quite experienced in a music documentary format film before.

We are then interrupted by a roadie sending Trip on an urgent mission, meaning he has to leave the concert (which he has snuck in to watch from the aisles). As he gets in his old van, the screen is filled with a small blue and red prescription pill which Trip takes – I wasn't sure why he was taking this, but it was a deliberate scene and I felt I should take note.

As Trip is driving, strange things start happening. The doll on his rear view mirror begins to come alive and buildings begin to mirror special effects at the concert by shooting fireballs. The story flips back and forth between the Metallica concert and Trip's adventures which vary from smashing his car, countless explosions to being chased and beaten by a mask wearing

I was really getting into the concert parts of the film and found the flips back to Trip's adventures increasingly frustrating. They made no sense to me and I had no idea whether we were supposed to think they were really happening, whether he was



crazy or whether the pill he took was making him hallucinate.

The story of Trip continues with him finding a leather duffel bag in the back of a truck. His expression when looking in the bag is that of shock, or horror and you automatically want to know what is inside. He then carries this bag with him for the remainder of his nightmarish adventure until he somehow telepathically destroys the Metallica concert stage whilst fighting the horseman. Metallica plays on despite the fact their stage was somehow blown to pieces and two people were injured enough to have to be

After finishing their impromptu "garage band" set on the damaged stage, Trip can be seen walking back into the venue and dropping the duffel bag on the now early empty stage.

We flash forward to the next scene, which sees Metalica playing alone on stage and Trip watching from afar. The camera closes in on the duffel bag and then the movie abruptly ends.

We are never shown what is in the bag and it seems a bit pointless. to have even incorporated this additional piece of the story, as it has no real relevance to the movie at all. As the film ended, I noticed that several people in the screening laughed or sighed and I felt I was not the only one to be a little confused.

I feel this movie would have been better left at a concert experience of Metallica. For someone who is definitely not a 'huge fan', the fact that I really enjoyed the music and the experience of their concert leads me to believe that the film would have been strong enough to stand alone, without the need for a side story which if anything, was more frustrating than appealing. The 3D is some of the best I have seen and the movie projects so much emotion that you cannot help but be carried away with the songs and the energy the band creates on set.

I am giving this movie 2 stars out of 5. Sadly, if the side story was left out, I would give this movie a 4...

TRUE CONFESSIONS: MY EXPERIENCE AS A

HOW I WAS INITIATED INTO A GANG

I was 15 years old at the time when my friend asked me to join a gang. I was a naïve hot head then so I felt that joining a gang would be a good idea because I would always have people covering my back whenever I got into a fight.

The initiation was pretty intense. The moment I arrived at their headquarters the 'master' told the newbies or 'neophytes' to immediately strip down and get naked - they were going to beat us all up to toughen us up. After stripping our clothes off we were blindfolded and then lead to the edge of a cliff. I could feel strong winds pounding on my face at the time and I could also hear the echoes of the masters' voice so I knew that we were standing in front of a really deep cliff. The moster then tied a rock to my 'member' and asked me if I still wanted to be part of the gang. I yelled 'yes master!' as loud as I can and then he said that as a test of allegiance he will drop the rock down the bottom of the cliff whilst my 'member' was tied to it! I still yelled 'go ahead master' and suddenly he dropped the rock! My heart stopped as the master dropped the rock but luckily the rock was only dropped near my feet and not over the cliff he was just testing to see how far I would go to join the gang.

The next part of the initiation was the tough one – we were all lined up in front of a roundabout of same sort. All the other masters were all around the roundabout armed with bats, pans and paddles ready to pound on the neophytes. We were all asked to run around the roundabout as fast as we can whist being punched, kicked and battered with bats and paddles. If we made it to the finish line then we're in - I was scared like hell!

I was the fourth one to run around the roundabout and as I watched the other three, I saw one fall down and the masters just ganged up and beat up on the poor kid! One of the other neaphytes also got smashed in the head with a frying pan and he was knocked out cold! It was finally my turn to run and I was planning to cover my head and let my body take the beating. My body can take a punishment: I'll be able to make it as long. as I cover my head.

So I ran covering my head and then I felt it all in one go - a baseball bat shattered through my ribs, a paddle whacked my lower back, I felt a few more baseball bat blows on my thighs as well as punches and kicks on my head. I nearly fell down once when I got struck by a baseball bat on my leg but I managed to get back up and keep running probably due to adrenain.

Luckily I had to leave the country for good because I had to move overseas and to date I feel that it was the best decision I ever made in my entire life. At the end of the day all I got to show for being a gang member were plenty of bruises; being part of a gang actually made my life a living hell because I had to always watch my back wherever I went just in case another gang decides to jump me and beat me up. If you're reading this then I hope that you don't make the same mistake that I did. You honestly don't need to join a gang to prove your manhood.

I remember a male classmate in college - tall and handsome with fantastic brown skin, full of dreams of becoming a star. He was just named '1st Runner-Up in a (now defunct) national pageant for men when he was approached by a very popular gay fashion designer who asked him if he was interested in joining his pool of male models, persuading him with talk of using this opportunity as a stepping stone to stardom. Knowing that taking up this offer would indeed open many doors for him, my friend, understandably became excited and was quite ready to say yes. But, he had noticed that the designer began to make disconcerting physical advances towards him. Repelled by even just the thought of it, my friend shut down the offer and along with it, all his dreams of fame and fortune.

Similar incidences, unfortunately, are not new to the entertainment industry. There was a reported and documented incident where a gay manager was caught on camera committing indecent acts on aspiring male models when they came in to audition for him. The term, 'casting couch' has therefore gained a dubious connotation in the industry. The despairing truth is, the victims, at that point in their careers would have felt that they had no choice but to endure the humiliation lest it mean the end of their fledgling journey to the big time if they refused. Hollywood A-listers like Meryl Streep, Susan Sarandon, Gwyneth Paltrow, Charlize Theron, Thandie Newton and Lisa Rinna have already opened up about their awful experiences with various entertainment industry professionals in the early stages of their acting careers. While 'casting couch' experiences can happen at any stage in an actor's or model's career, it is the newcomers that suffer the most. Their inexperience plays against them as they are lured with promises of roles or photshoots which more experienced professionals will know immediately are false.

Another challenge facing not only aspiring actors and

actresses, but established stars, is the question of nudity. While nudity can mean more sensationalism and therefore more attention to the film, its relevance to storylines is increasingly being questioned and has actually pushed some actresses (such as Jennifer Garner, Rachel Bilson, Olivia Munn, Megan Fox) to include a 'No Nudity' clause to their contracts. This does not mean that the pressure to go full frontal is not ever-present in the industry. Some, like Amanda Seyfried in her latest film, 'Lovelace' admits that going topless was 'liberating', the act was in keeping with her character and with the movie's plot. Distressingly, many other nude scenes have no reason to be in the movie at all - only a gratuitous show of flesh.

It is perhaps naive to hope that these unsavory practices will cease to continue in the industry as more and more people come forward. No aspiring (or established) talent deserves to be treated in such a manner, to have the dreams manipulated to such a sad end. But one can always stand to hope. One can hope that superstardom can be achieved through sheer talent, hard work, dedication and passion for the craft. Hope that that combination will be enough to create a fanbase. But that hope also rests on the public. Now privy to the dark underbelly of the entertainment industry, the public needs to make informed decisions as to which movie or TV show to watch. If their patronage veers towards entertainment with more substance that flashing flesh, maybe, just maybe, the horrors and humiliation that my classmate (and others who can relate to this story) endured will no longer happen to another unsuspecting hopeful.

Artists, models and actors are born artists, models and actors. Generally called artists, they possess skills, talents, imagination, inclination and passion in the arts in it broad spectrum of music, theatre, dance, performing, film and literature. Nonetheless, these are skills which can be cultured and honed to be considered in the upper echelons of their craft.

To be called an artist, however, is not easy. Skills and talent alone are not enough, and even when paired with imagination and passion, success and recognition is still not guaranteed. Many do succeed, but others fail and even more remain mediocre - just like in any other profession. So, how do you escape the middle ground? The following are keys to becoming successful artists:

Foremost is training. The reason why training is a very important factor is because the arts is a well-studied discipline. It stems from history, theory and practice. Here, it refers to its study and practice wherein it can be earned in full or part time studies as a degree or certificate; workshops; and daily class/training. Examples include degrees or certificates in fine arts; acting workshops; modeling workshops; classes for ballet, etc. These trainings include routines and disciplines which define and hone skills. It explores imagination of talents through complex and comprehensive mentoring. Thorough and consistent training are keys to mastery. Furthermore, training gauges the level of performance of the artist.

Secondary is discipline. Early on in the training, one has to breathe in discipline. It becomes second nature

like doing warm-up exercises and stretching prior to joining a ballet class, for example. Discipline includes coming to class prepared and on time. Preparation includes the materials or costumes as needed. Some training require coming to class very early than the scheduled time. Hence, discipline is necessary.

Third is attitude. There should be focus in coming to class. Attitude encompasses skills, talent and passion. When attitude towards a particular activity is attained, the artist is most likely on the right track and will reap the fruits of his labor in due time. Patience is a virtue.

Fourth is apprenticeship. Always look for opportunities to become an apprentice in your chosen field. This will be a proper thrust to a budding career. Success starts small or unrecognized until your talent is acknowledged. Aim to standout.

Fifth is finding support. It is your responsibility to find support from parents, siblings, friends, etc. You will encourage their approval by showing them that you are worthy to your artistry. Investment is as important a factor to be able to continue training.

The above points only serve as guidelines on how to become successful as artists, models and actors. The list can go on and on. But if you can pocket those basic guidelines, opportunities are endless in the arts industry. Don't stop. Strive. Keep on looking until you get hold of what fits you best. There is so much talent to be exhausted when there is proper training and avenue. Do not settle for less - reach for the star!

The event was held on my brother's anniversary, which is another good reason why this event is so memorable...not only did I feel a massive sense of pride when I walked out on the stage, but meeting so many people that felt so strongly about our heroes made me even more proud of being a part of something special."

The down-to-earth British beauty has learned "to not take everything too seriously" during her time as a model. Knowing how easily one's self-esteem can take a battering while working in the industry, Dannielle cannot emphasise enough how important it is to "have fun!" "I think it is very important to stay positive and always be proud of who you are. It's not always about what you look like, it's about what's on the inside that counts. It's about your beauty within! This will always, always shine through."

The full support of her family has been invaluable to Dannielle during her career especially that of her mother, whose constant encouragement from the beginning has meant that "I am still doing what I love five years later!" When I first went to Italia Conti I thought I was a dancer, I swiftly realized I was more of an actress, that was hard to accept. when I did my walk I was approached by some of the other models and complemented on my shape, it said a lot to me that not everyone admires the same things. Also, rejection is common and you just have to realize it genuinely isn't personal.

What do you hope for your future both short and long term?

In an ideal world I want to be working in musical theatre, I want to do eight shows a week on stage doing what I love. In the short term I would love to find more paid performance work, too many people in this industry expect you to work for free. I work six jobs to sustain my rent, food, travel, dance classes, singing lessons, unpaid casting. It all adds up, so having more paid work in my field would mean I could stop doing jobs that have no connection to my career.

Is there any advice you would give others who are starting out in acting or modelling?

Networking is essential, it's horrible and nobody really likes to do it but you really have to put yourself out there and try and make connections because it really is "who you know". Don't do your job for other people, I heard a fantastic quote on a documentary on "A Chorus Line" and I started to live by it: "When I'm in an audition, I'm not performing for a panel of judges, I am dancing my own private party and the panel are invited."

With a level of enthusiasm and professionalism that is rarely seen in this world, Vix has all the characteristics and traits of someone who is destined for success. She realizes that hard work has to be put in and accepts working for free and self doubt as obstacles that have to be overcome but her passion is incredibly evident and moving.

"Some people you choose a job. For others it's like the job chooses you."



"...I believe that we're all created with gifts. As a Christian I believe that I have been instilled with the desire to create, to encourage, and I'm pretty competitive too, so I'm always out there looking to better my last performance and striving to achieve greater results every time..." While Matt continually pushes himself to improve at his craft, he doesn't neglect to appreciate the people he is surrounded by at every job. "...We're all collaborators on a massive art project, be it on stage or on screen, and every person's role on that project is important..." His admiration for

his fellow artisans is further magnified "...as so many of these projects often go unnoticed or unpublicised, many of them are often works of love and the people working on them volunteer their time and efforts..."

Like many of his fellow actors, Matt's career has run the gamut of highs and lows. From being humiliated on stage by another performer, to having an audience "oo'ing and ah'ing" during a romantically tender scene; from being completely immersed in a character that he doesn't completely remember what just transpired in a scene, to even making children cry! "It's a career of love, of persistence, of patience, and a hell of a lot of work... and is a gift that I'll never be capable of dropping..."

While the Sydney-based performer admits that "...acting runs through my veins...", being a husband and a father has meant that he has had to be creative with the different avenues of his career. Meet Hip-Hop's Rising Star

Like many artists before him, Hip-Hop/Rap artist, Mugzy, can attest to music's saving grace. Eminem's song, 'Purple Pills', was the catalyst for this performer to transform a troubled adolescence into one with purpose and passion. It was Hip-Hop that captured his heart and ambition. Harnessing a discovered natural talent, Mugzy began his studies in hip-hop music and culture with Eminem and eventually, other legendary artists such as 2 Pac, Biggie, 50 Cent and DMX, captured his imagination and challenged him to delve deeper into the genre.

His first step into the limelight was in 2009 at his high school's end-of-year assembly. "...I was so nervous because there were about 200/300 people in the crowd (and this was my first performance EVER)...After my set the people cheered so LOUD they kept screaming (ENCORE! ENCORE!) when I walked off-stage...I felt so good inside...I just wanted to do it all over again..." From then on, he knew his path in life was set.

But this young man didn't just rely on his innate ability. For the next 2 years, he broadened his knowledge of music by attending courses that allowed him to explore the other sides of the craft such as production and songwriting. Mugzy was never one to shy away from a challenge. He used his difficult teenage years as inspiration for his songs with the fervent hope that other young people will find their own strength in his lyrics to face, and defeat, their demons.

Finally, Mugzy's hard work paid off with the release of his first album, 'Ride or Die' which was recorded with Schollum City Records. The album garnered him enough attention to be asked for radio interviews and he has been able to meet a plethora of hip-hop/rap's who's who such as Fabolous, as well as Treach and DJ Kay Gee from Naughty by Nature. Last year, he performed at the "UrbanStar Talent Quest" in Sydney. Among the crowd was Marcus Pernell, a retired producer for the iconic hip-hop and urban music label, Def Jam. "...After the show, I got the chance to speak with him and his words to me were: "I really enjoyed your performance man, it was DOPE."...hearing those words from someone who used to work for [Def Jam), one of the biggest record labels in America is so overwhelming..." So impressed was Pernell that the two established a friendship that Mugzy hopes, one day, will result in a collaboration.

For Mugzy, the thrill and energy of performing your own material for an audience is one of the many perks of his chosen career. He enjoys meeting people and building connections to get his music heard. He accepts that he has to balance creativity with the sheer hard work of promoting his music. "...putting my name down on any gigs possible, even if it's a small pub...it's still getting your music/name heard..."

It hasn't been an easy road and Mugzy daily walks that fine line of hoping for the major success of his art to not building up those same hopes too high. Past experience has taught him harsh lessons but still, he plows on undeterred. He performed at last year's 'World Supremacy Backgrounds International Dance Championship' which is the Southern Hemisphere's largest street dance competition. He has just released his second album, 'Understand Me' (whose tracks are already playing in radio stations around the world) and is already hard at work on the third. Mugzy is also a volunteer for MMAD – 'Musicians Making A Difference' – an Australian charity dedicated to empowering disadvantaged and abused youth using music, dance and mentoring to transform their lives.

With his passion and talent, there are no limits on how far Mugzy will go with his music career. Absolutely none. Who knows? Perhaps a collaboration with the artist that started him on his journey in the first place – Eminem.
