

# JUNIOR MISS AUSTRALIA CONTINENTS 2017











These qualities allowed her to stand out from her competition, which is a reality TV show that aims to be a mixture of Australia's Next Top Model, Survivor and Apprentice. The show will be filmed in Punta Cana, Dominican Republic, in November and Keaton will be one of the ten finalists featured.

Keaton graduated from the University of New England with a degree in zoology but soon realized that entering a modeling contest could be a rewarding experience. Unlike other modeling shows, Miss Multiverse asked for an array of talents beyond the catwalk. Keaton still plans to take a post-graduate course in zoology although is still enjoying her year off from her studies.

The Miss Multiverse auditions included IQ testing and a ten pin bowling event before the top ten finalists were sent to Punta Cana. 



You would have heard of the Atkins Diet, and you've probably heard of Paleo by now - but, what of the newest buzz word in dietary regimes -Banting? It's increasingly on the radar of late, but what you might not know is that Banting is actually a revival of a fairly old idea. But, what on earth is it? Can it help you lose weight? And, more importantly, is it any good for your health?

Banting refers to a no/low carb, high fat diet. The aim of this approach is to convert the body's metabolic response. This means shifting from burning carbohydrate to burning fat instead. Banting is still a bit of an obscure name in nutritional trends (especially compared to its wellknown 'cousins' Atkins and Paleo). However, it has actually been around for a whole while longer.

Banting has a long and colourful history. The dietary regime is named after Mr William Banting, a prominent undertaker and coffin maker hailing from London. He embarked upon his Banting diet in as far back as the dusty old days of the mid 1800's. It seems he was trendy without even knowing it.

He had good reason to find a diet plan. For although he was very rich, Mr Banting didn't have it all. He was morbidly obese (which is a bit ironic considering his occupation). A successful business man, he was one of the lucky ones amonast the population at the time to be privileged enough to

very well-fed. Too much indulging in the finer things in life had Mr Banting seeking a way to undo the damage on his waistline and wellbeing.

He was responsible for popularising Banting as the first formalised diet of our times aimed at restricting the intake of carbohydrates (particularly starches and sugars). The diet was formulated by Soho Square physician Dr. William Harvey, who had gained insight (in the context of diabetes management) from the lectures of the French 'Father of Modern Physiology' Claude Bernard.



The diet of canting (as prescribed in the book) propounds the benefits of eating only those foods that are very high in fat. That means those often fat-laden goodies that you drool over but generally do your best to hide from: butter and bacon, for example. And while this sounds great in theory, you do have to be completely steadfast in avoiding certain food groups to no exception.

Banting is about consuming only three square meals a day that are high in fat and medium in protein content, with as little carbohydrate going into your system as possible. The intention is that you always feel full. You are meant to eat only when you are hungry. The idea is that there is no snacking, so no extra consumption of calories.

So what exactly can you eat when you are 'Banting'? It's not all bad news. On the 'green

light,' list are cheese and eggs, all meats and seafood. Plus you can have mayo, butter, avocado and full fat cream if you wish - so there's not too much compromise on taste in this diet. You can also have leafy green vegetables. Unlike Paleo you can consume dairy - so that's a bit of a plus.

What do you have to say goodbye to? You can't eat potatoes of any kind, no rice or soy products, or any grains at all. It's also a no to legumes, couscous etc. Of course, you can't have any sugar or any foods naturally high in sugar - so that includes all varieties of fruit and fruit juices etc. You have to be brutal with your resolve to avoid all these foods so that the diet can be effective.

Is the diet healthy? It's questionable as to whether no/low carb, high fat diets promote health or whether they produce side-effects of the longterm. If you have a medical issue you should always consult your doctor before beginning any dietary regime..

Proponents of banting say that its biggest benefit is that it allows you control the amount that you eat minus the cravings. You don't feel like you are starving and you don't feel as though you are entirely missing out on tasty food. Which makes sustaining your diet all that much more likely. Losing weight is, after all, about sticking to a plan in the long-term. Whatever your thoughts on Banting, its fast becoming the new buzzword in the diet fad and foodie world.


