SKINCARE FOR

As temperatures draw downwards, as daylight hours get shorter and as the air gets crisper, there are a few things that we need to think about when it comes to our daily skin care routine. The approach of winter brings a drop in humidity, a harsher wind chill factor and can result in sensitivities. In terms of our skin it's a time to pay it more attention and to give it the care that it deserves. So, what can you do to ensure beautiful skin all year round?

Nourish

What you might not realise is that plump, radiant skin is best served from the inside. The skin's cell renewal system works on a 28 day-cycle so healthy eating, drinking plenty of water, getting a good night's rest and avoiding too much caffeine/ alcohol is always the best prescription for the health of your skin. Revive it when it's a bit under the weather by sticking to a sensible regime and the rewards will follow.

There are a couple of other ways to boost the quality of your skin during winter. Keep up your Omega 3 intake, whether by supplements of through nutrition (try consuming more salmon, walnuts and flaxseed, for example). Fatty acids benefit the body in a lot of ways, particularly when the climate is colder. Aside from supporting the nervous system and improving heart health, they are perfect for improving your appearance, gracing you with a radiant complexion (and also shiny locks).

Protect your PH levels

Preserving your skin's natural barrier is your best line of defence against the wrath of frigid temperatures. Do this by avoiding soap, surfactants and sulphates that can strip your skin. Looking for a cleanser that is soapfree and PH balanced. Avoid Sodium Lauryl Sulphate and Sodium Laureth Sulphate where possible. It has been proven that these chemicals can remove skin's natural lipids (the oils in your skin that keep it smooth and hydrated).

Moisturise

Cold and wind can strip your skin of vital moisture. During winter look for a moisturiser high in emollient ingredients. Emollients provide a protective layer on the skin that guards against environments stresses. Therefore, they greatly reduce moisture loss. Some people are particularly susceptible to effects of winter temperatures on their skin and experience flare ups of serious skin disorders such as psoriasis and eczema.

Some examples of high quality and natural emollient ingredients include coco/shea butter, argan/olive oil and also beeswax. They are perfect for anyone with dry, irritated or ageing skin. They are safe for use on sensitive skin. An emollient rich lip balm will serve you well during the winter months, It's often hard to avoid cracked lips during this season.

Also, don't skip the night cream. Your skin replenishes itself best at night and this is also, obviously, when the temperature drops lower. If you use a heater you will encounter even more dryness in the air. So make sure you do your best to protect your skin during the night with an emollient rich moisturiser. This is even better coupled with a serum and an eye-cream.

So, there you have it: some simple ways to care for your skin all year round. You don't have to sacrifice beautiful skin just because it's winter. With a little more care and attention you can overcome anything the season could possibly throw at you, particularly when it comes to your complexion and the health of your skin.

He confesses that "future plans are to take it as it comes. I may get spotted tomorrow or may never make it to the big time; we'll just have to see where I go."





Sophie Grosser, StarCentral's Choice and Miss Grand Australia's 2017 Second Runner Up, was just 5 years old when the modeling world beckoned. Her mother enrolled her at the then-Tanya Powell Modelling Agency (now Powell Models) where she did commercials for the South Australian department store, Harris Scarfe and for Miki House, a Japanese children's clothing brand. As a teenager, she took a break from modeling but at 21, the world called to her again and she hasn't looked back since.

Having studied both makeup artistry and interior design, and is a trained ballet dancer, the modeling industry fits into Sophie's love for the creative arts. She reveals that what she enjoys most about modeling is "the different roles you are able to slip into depending on what your job is, you can go from feeling extremely glamorous to sporty or edgy, it's kind of like acting but without the pressure of getting your lines right I guess. I love watching the whole creative process...so much work goes into getting that one perfect picture and I enjoy seeing how the stylists, hair and makeup artists, photographers and client all work together to come up with their idea of how they want the image to look." And that variety in the modeling world was no more evident than at one of the 24-year old's favourite photoshoots which involved urban clothing brand, Unfold. She shares that "they wanted someone with a dancer's background for the role...it was really fun to lose the standard types of poses and just pretend I was dancing around in some gorgeous clothes."

While the half Australian/half German's love for the modeling world is absolute, she confesses to the challenges she faces daily such as the enormous amount of pressure she puts on herself to succeed and achieve "the next big goal." The chance of rejection is also an ever-present hurdle. But Sophie has discovered an innovative way to get her through it. She shares that she was "told once when you are going for roles to think of yourself as an item of clothing not as the person that you are. So, you might be a green skirt, however, this season they are only looking for yellow skirts so don't feel too disheartened if you don't get the role as next season they may be loving green skirts again and that will be your time to shine."

With the constant emphasis on one's physicality, keeping a level head is another challenge that faces models every day. According to Sophie, "the key to staying grounded is to have a good mix of people that you surround yourself with, I have a beautiful group of friends that I can laugh and be myself with and not worry that they are seeing me without makeup or not how people expect you to look all the time."

Sophie Grosser's modeling career has all the hallmarks of becoming a successful one. Because she admits that she has the tendency to "stress myself out way too much..." when she plans too far ahead, Sophie is forcing herself to relax and enjoy her current modeling contract in Manila, Philippines. After she returns home, she says that she'll see "what opportunities present themselves before I make any more big decisions."

Only the best of the best will be sent overseas to hopefully, bring back the crown.


Yolandi has only known two things in her working life;


2. They Celebrate Differences


